After Action Report

Family and Friends of the 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment Association gathered for our fourth annual reunion on Oct. 20, 2010 in Oklahoma City in honor of the 68th anniversary of the activation of the 508th PIR. Additionally, we celebrated the safe return of the current 508 from a long, second tour of duty in Afghanistan. With over eighty people in attendance, everyone had a great time reminiscing and creating new and lasting memories.

Daily activities were numerous, yet well paced and enjoyable. After a hearty, gratifying breakfast, our annual membership meeting got underway. Many thanks to those who were in attendance for providing valuable input and much needed insight!

Afternoon activities culminated with a moving and memorable tour of the National Oklahoma City Memorial, site of the April, 20 1995 bombing of the Murrah federal building. Through a well organized, highly informative, and moving presentation, the very articulate tour guide delivered us back to that tragic spring day.

After such a stirring experience at the bombing site, we retired to the Command Post for a 'lil "stirring" of our own! The conversation and drinks flowed to the late hours of the night, while folks spun tales, caught up with old friends, and formed new and lasting bonds with others. It was a fitting way to unwind, reflect, and relax after an exciting and emotionally charged day.

Friday we toured the 45th Infantry Museum, which has the third largest collection of weapons in the United States, many items appropriated from Hitler's home, and a tremendous display of sketches by Bill Mauldin, famous WWII cartoonist. The wide and varied items on display provided hours of entertainment and enjoyable education, making it difficult for many of us to leave when the time came.

During our formal banquet dinner, everyone was dressed to impress and several members donned their military dress uniforms. Before the meal, the Airborne Demonstration team color guard presented the colors. We had a beautiful candle lighting ceremony and invocation by Don Hunter, retired Army Chaplin. After dinner, CSM Bert Puckett, a two tour 508 combat veteran spoke about our army's activities in Afghanistan and the tremendous legacy of warriors our active duty 508 is continuing to generate. We ended our evening with a wonderful raffle dominated by our Wisconsin contingent.

Saturday's schedule included a much anticipated event; a special trip to Fredrick, Oklahoma, home of the WWII Airborne Demonstration Team. The cold, blustery, rainy day, made the long bus journey seem endless. As we reached the World War Two wooden hanger and home of the ADT, we were greeted by a dozen or so troopers in authentic WWII uniforms. The hanger contained two C-47's, a couple of vintage Willys jeeps, a deuce and a half, sleeping quarters, offices, a mess hall and latrines. The various displays contained a myriad of items from the WWII era. We climbed aboard and throughout the C-47, watched the troopers pack parachutes on the packing tables and wandered tirelessly throughout this incredible facility. Our hosts served lunch using period metal mess trays and army issue tableware. The inclement weather prevented the team from jumping but we all lined up for a flight in the C-47. After the troopers prepared the plane for flight, our first "stick" readied for take off and taxied to the runway. In an unfortunate turn, the plane developed a mechanical problem which ended our plans to fly. Despite the misfortune, we had a great time and spent the rest of our tour taking photos and telling stories. At this time, we realized we had several sub-groups that added greatly to this reunion and hopefully, are a sign of growth and change within our association. We had veterans from WWII, the Korean Conflict, active duty 508 recently returned from Afghanistan, the ADT and Family and Friends of the 508.

Regrettably I was unable to make the breakfast Sunday because of my cross-country drive. Oklahoma City was a great success and I hope everyone had as much fun and fellowship as I. Thanks to all who attended, with a special thanks to Jason Wolcott and the ADT. I am eternally grateful to our National Chairman and tireless worker for the 508, Dick O'Donnell. 508th Honored at Wollaton Park

During Britain's Armed Forces weekend, a new memorial dedicated to the 508th PIR was unveiled at Wollaton Park. The memorial was designed and built by Phil Kirk of Nottingham. Phil undertook this project at his own expense and spent about a year completing it.



Over the course of the weekend, re-enactors set up a base camp that gave a realistic glimpse into what the park looked like during the war. They had tents set up with cots and all the war time accoutrements, jeeps, troops dressed in WWII jump suits, weapons displays, jump equipment displays and a chow line.

Items discovered during last year's excavation of the park were on display at the 508th Museum. Captain William Nation's 8 mm war time films were shown and admired by all who saw them. A mortar demonstration was performed.

During the ceremony to unveil the monument, the First Allied Airborne Honor Guard Association posted the colors of the 508th PIR and the U.S. National Colors. Graham Lawson read a letter of appreciation from the Family and Friends of the 508th PIR Assn. and a C-47 made a fly over. The ceremony was conducted by Reverend Mieke Gaynor. Nottingham native, John Savage, spoke of how as a twelve year old boy, he would get fish and chips for troopers who were confined to camp.

People of Nottingham remember Paratroopers

In early March of 1944, 2,000 American troops of the 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment arrived in Nottingham after spending several months training in Ireland. According to a 508 history by paratrooper Hank LeFebvre, Don Jakeway said it best:

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"You can imagine our joy when we first set foot in this wonderful city, after spending a couple of months in that barren, cheerless area of North Ireland. We busted our butts during the daylight hours getting the camp ready, but once the sun set, we hustled those same butts into town."

A tent city sprang up on the grounds of Wollaton Hall and, when they were not training for D-Day, they frequented the pubs and dance halls around the city.

On June 6, 1944, from a height of just 400 feet, the men of the 508th jumped into a sky full of tracer bullets above the Normandy countryside.

When they were finally pulled out of the front line on July 15, of the 2,056 men who jumped on D-Day, just 918 returned to Wollaton Park, the rest killed, missing or captured.

In the 66 years since then, the people of Nottingham have never forgotten the Yanks...and the old soldiers have never forgotten Nottingham.

The memorial, officially unveiled by Elmer Melchi on March 14, is a fitting reminder of a brief but unique period in our city's history.

Elmer Returns to Nottingham with bride.

Elmer Melchi was one of the lucky ones – the GI from Colorado survived the Normandy invasion, the Arnhem debacle and capture by the Germans. He returned to his home in the shadow of the Rockies with three bullets lodged in his body...and a beautiful Nottingham bride on his arm.

In March, Elmer returned with his wife June for the unveiling of a memorial to the 82nd Airborne, 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment, who were camped in Wollaton Park before they flew to France in June 1944.

Elmer and June met at the American Red Cross HQ in the Albert Hall—and defied US Army rates to marry in 1945.

"I was freed from a German POW camp by the Russians. I had been wounded trying to escape, so I should have gone straight back States. Instead, I made my way to England and to Nottingham to marry my girl" said Elmer.

Sixty-five years later, they are proud grandparents. Speaking from their home in Colorado City, June said, "They said it wouldn't last," "It was love at first sight," interrupted her husband.

Elmer and his buddies of the 508th arrived in Nottingham on March 14, 1944. They were struck by the beauty of the park with its castle and loved the local entertainment. Elmer said, "I remember the Gregory – my wife's mother worked there." June, formerly Miss Lloyd of Bedford Boulevard, said, "You have to admit, we gave you all a wonderful welcome. Nottingham took you guys in. We were proud of the 82nd."

There were no arguments from Elmer, who explained what happened next. "We landed in France; it was a bit of a mess. We had a lot of casualties...and then jumped into Holland and

lost more. I got captured and taken to a POW camp in the north. One night bombers flew over, heading for Berlin and Stettin. The guards were distracted and I thought, 'this in my chance', but I didn't make it. I was shot four times and I still have three bullets in me."

Elmer and June were married on June 16, 1945, and then headed to the picturesque Colorado City. They have four sons – one served three tours in Vietnam in the 1970's. The couple have returned to Nottingham several times to see family and June insists: "It is lovely over here, but I am still a Nottingham girl. There is no place like home."

Health Update

Hamblin, Sylvia

As of this date, Sylvia is doing reasonable well, but the future is less promising. During the first part of October, the population of her home was hit by a case of intestinal disorder. Sylvia managed to get it for a few days. This weakened her enough and she got pneumonia which ultimately required her being hospitalized for about 4 days. These two events, her progressing dementia, plus being 91 have sort of tipped the balance. She has no appetite, will not eat or drink very much plus at this stage of dementia, she can't really tell you what, when or how much she has eaten. The staff at the home have been wonderful about trying to persuade her to eat and drink. Kitty or I take her favorite food to her every day (Whopper Jr. no cheese), but we are lucky to get her to eat a quarter of it. We try to stimulate her with homemade pumpkin cake or other treats.

We have had several meetings with her doctor, who is a close personal friend of Kitty and me, as well as the nursing home staff. Mother has a "Do Not Resuscitate" and "No Feeding Tube" medical health directive. She will receive all medical treatments for any illness or condition that can be corrected or improve the quality of life. However, if she continues to lose weight, does not increase her food and fluid intake, there will become in the near future, a downward spiral that can not be reversed. She will always be given comfort care, be free of pain and discomfort.

He was commissioned a 2nd Lt. following graduation from OCS in July, 1942. Col. LeFebvre volunteered for parachute troops and was assigned to the 508th PIR and went overseas

to Europe in December, 1943. He was a Platoon leader in the parachute jump into Normandy on D-Day, June 6, 1944. Col. It was Tom and his wife, Molly, who donated flags from every state in the United States to the Airborne Museum in St. Mère Église. Most states donated flags, but there were a few who didn't. Tom purchased these flags himself so

that every state would be represented in the museum. In 2006, he was honored by the people of Picauville, by having a room named after him in their town hall.

My first trip to Normandy was in 2004. I attended a ceremony at the 508th Park in Chef du Pont where I took a photo of a 508th veteran whom I did not know. Later that year, I attended the 508th Reunion where I was determined to find the veteran whose photo I had taken. It was Tom. I remember he told me a great story about General Gavin. In Normandy, Tom was showing General Gavin their machine gun emplacements when the Germans began shelling them. Tom jumped into a small ditch and General Gavin jumped on top of him saying, "Move over son." Tom replied, "There's only room for one in here, Sir!"

I only met Tom in person twice, but he was always very kind to me and often would call me on the telephone. For me it was a real honor to receive a telephone call from him. He emailed me a copy of his book, "Jump Into Darkness", which I thoroughly enjoyed reading and we later discussed. I was especially touched by the ending of his story when he talks about the end of the Normandy campaign. As they were marching to the beach to return to England, Tom realized he was the only one remaining from his stick. With tears streaming down his face, he stepped out of line, turned back to face Normandy, and saluted. This was his way of saying goodbye to the buddies he would never see again.

In 2008, in a telephone conversation with Tom, we were talking about his special room in Picauville. In it there is a plaque with the names of all the 508th Normandy KIAs. I told him how touching that was to me and seeing all those names made me realize the terrible price of freedom. Tom said that plaque was the most important thing to him in that room. He wanted to make sure his buddies were not forgotten. During our conversation he said he knew he would never again be able to return to his beloved Normandy. I will never forget his words to me. He said, "Ellen, it is up to you now and your generation. Please don't let my comrades who never came home be forgotten." I assured him I would not. He always said those men were the true heroes.

I like to think that today Tom is somewhere reunited with the buddies he lost during the war and those who have passed on before him having their own 508th reunion.
