

Col. Louis G. Mendez. Jr. July 14, 1915 - September 19, 2001

Colonel Mendez graduated from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y. in the Class of 1940.

At Camp Blanding, Florida he assumed command of the 3rd Battalion of the 508 Parachute Infantry Regiment upon their activation in October 1942.

He forged the men under his command into a combat-ready unit of soldiers whose *esprit de corps* would serve them well under the baptism of fire in Normandy.

On June 6, 1944 (D-Day) he parachuted with his Battalion 10 miles inland from the Atlantic Wall behind the German lines.

For thirty-three days without relief Colonel Mendez and his men distinguished themselves as they pushed back the enemy, thereby sparing the seaborne landings at Utah and Omaha Beach from further asaault. At great cost in human lives, the largest airborne armada in the history of warfare helped secure the beaches and guaranteed the break-through onto the Normandy peninsula.

Colonel Mendez was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for leading the attack that captured the town of Prétot, France on June 20, 1944. On September 17, 1944 Colonel Mendez parachuted into Holland in the Nijmegen sector with his men. Again, the 508 fought valiantly, liberating many Dutch towns.

The final assault took place in December, 1944 – the Battle of the Bulge- where Colonel Mendez's 3rd Battalion distinguished themselves at Thier- du-Mont Ridge and at Lanzerath. At war's end, May 8, 1945 the 508 was assigned to SHAEF Headquarters in Franfurt-am-Main, Germany were it served as honor guard to General Eisenhower.

Colonel Mendez then took over command of the 508 Regiment.

A solemn procession of mourners paid a final tribute to Colonel Louis G. Mendez. His flag-draped coffin was drawn by horses on a caisson escorted by an Honor Guard from Fort Meyers in dress blues. A military band, honor guard platoon and rifle saluting squad accompanied our beloved Commander to his final resting place.

At the wake in Falls Church, Virginia men of the 508 PIR gathered with the Mendez family and 150 friends Tuesday evening. Paul Hamblin (C Co.) conducted a brief service with the gracious consent and support of Mrs. Jeannie Mendez.

Paul Hamblin traced the record of Colonel Mendez with the 508 Parachute Infantry Regiment. He emphasized that in 1998 at our Reunion in Nashville, Tennessee "the Association named Col. Mendez, 'Our General', as a measure of the love and respect we had for him. - a rank we all believed was long overdue." Paul read a poem titled, "I'm Free", which best expressed Col. Mendez's words to his family, friends and to men of the 508. Francis Lamoureux (G Co) fastened the 508 PIR Association Red-Devil insignia on the side of the casket. Each member of the 508 delegation saluted farewell to "Our General" in turn, did an about-face and retired.

At the head of the casket is the 508 PIR insignia placed there at the wake by Francis M. Lamoureux,, Association Secretary. Fittingly, our beloved Colonel Louis G. Mendez is buried in a plot surrounded by Generals.
