On May 8, 2005 in Portstewart, Northern Ireland, a monument will be unveiled to pay tribute to the 508. This has been accomplished through the generous efforts of John McCann, who has proved to be a true friend of the 508 and it's role in the liberation of Europe. The inscription on the stone monument will read:

Dedicated to the Men/ of the/ 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment/ 82nd Airborne Division/
United States Army/ STATIONED IN "CAMP CROMORE"/ 9th January — 11th March 1944/
WWII Campaigns/ NORMANDY/ HOLLAND/ BELGIUM.

A delegation from the 82nd Airborne, including men from the 505, the 507, the 325, the 508 and 82nd Hq have been invited. The 508 monument will be unveiled by former 508 PIRA Secretary, Francis M. Lamoureux.

President's Report:

With a sad heart, I write this last message as President of our Association.

My wife, Sally, passed away July 11, 2004. She enjoyed attending our reunions. She was always at my side. We wanted to celebrate the retirement of our association with all of you at Camp Blanding, Florida on Tuesday, October 19, 2004.



First reunion: Gene Williams and Jack Williams, twin sons of Lt. Gene Williams (Hq 3rd) attended with their mother, Mary Lear, who lives in Gainesville. The twins were born June 8, 1944 in Mobile, Alabama – just two days after their father jumped into Normandy on D-day. Lt. Williams was officer in charge of the 3rd Battalion Pathfinder Team. He was killed June 20, 1944, at Prétot. Hours later, a telegram arrived to inform him of the birth of his twin sons.




Seated(Rear-Left), Gene Williams and (Right)

It was Sternesky's first 508 reunion and the first time that he had met with Lamoureux since 1945. The Williams twins were regaled by stories from "Sterno" and "Lamo" about combat experiences with their father on Hill 30.

The twins emulated their father. Both saw combat, as paratroopers, in Vietnam. Gene and Jack are Associate Members assigned to Hq Co. 3rd Battalion.

Visitor from France Jean Baptiste Feuillye, (better-known as Bobbie) made a hit at the reunion



60 years ago, Bobbie, age 13, was home alone in Fresville about one mile from Ste. Mère-Église — first town liberated in Normandy by the 82nd Airborne on D-Day. His folks had gone out to work in the fields. They were not yet aware that the invasion had started. In the following months he made friends with paratroopers and GI's. They adopted Bobbie as a mascot.

After the war he worked at the American Cemetery above Omaha Beach, spending many hours tending the graves of American soldiers.

In 1994, Bobbie met O.B. Hill in Normandy and they became close friends.

Over the years, Bobbie led many Normandy tours for the 508. This year, he attended his first 508 reunion to honor us for liberating France.

At our O.B. Hill Memorial Banquet, Bobbie read "A Message from Normandy" in which he pays tribute to all the American soldiers who rest in peace in the cemetery at Omaha Beach. "The people of Normandy will never forget them", says Bobbie, "we are eternally indebted to them for their sacrifice."

508th Parachute Infantry Regiment Association 1942-1945

Resolution

WHEREAS: The 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment, comprised of volunteers from the Forty-Eight States, was activated October 20, 1942 at Camp Blanding, Florida; and after basic training at Camp Blanding and parachutist qualification at Fort Benning, Georgia, and tactical unit training in Camp Mackall, North Carolina, Ireland, and England, the Regiment, attached to the 82nd Airborne Division, parachuted into Normandy, France on D-Day, June 6, 1944 as the vanguard of the sea-borne forces. After accomplishing all of its missions, the Regiment returned to Nottingham, England for replacements and equipment; and

WHEREAS: On September 17, 1944, the reconstituted Regiment parachuted into Nijmegen, Holland as part of the force committed to liberating the Netherlands; and on December 18, 1944 the Regiment was rushed to Werbomont, Belgium to help defeat the last major German offensive, and fought heroically in the Rhineland, Ardennes, and Central Europe campaigns; and

WHEREAS: On April 4, 1945, the Regiment was detached from the 82nd Airborne Division and came under control of the First Allied Airborne Army; it moved immediately to airfields prepared to parachute on prisoner-of-war camps to liberate prisoners. Upon cessation of hostilities, having sustained 2670 battle casualties, won five unit decorations for heroic actions, and individual members of the Regiment having earned every decoration authorized by the United States Government, and decorations from the governments of Belgium, France, Great Britain and the Netherlands, and having been chosen as the Honor Guard for General Dwight D. Eisenhower's Supreme Headquarters; the Regiment, on June 8, 1945, moved to Frankfurt-am-Main, Germany; and

WSTEREAS: On November 24, 1946, after four years, one month and four days of outstanding service, the 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment was deactivated at Camp Kilmer, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS: On July 6, 1975, in Chicago, Illinois, veterans of the Regiment created the 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment Association, 1942-1945 to affirm and renew the friendships shared during World War II, and perpetuate the memory of all who served in the Regiment; and

WSIEREAS: On August 6, 2002, the General Membership having determined the Association can no longer function effectively, because of aging, resolved to on October 20, 2004 transfer Association assets and memorabilia to the Camp Blanding Museum and Historical Associates, Inc., Starke, Florida for safeguarding and display in the Camp Blanding Museum; and formally retire the 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment Association, 1942-1945.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Kenneth J. Merritt, President of the 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment Association, 1942-1945, do hereby in accordance with this Resolution, as approved by the General Membership, officially transfer Association assets and memorabilia to the Camp Blanding Museum and Historical Associates, Inc., Starke, Florida effective October 19, 2004.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment Association, 1942-1945 to be affixed this October 19, in the year of Our Lord two thousand and four.
