He recalled the forming of the Regiment. Its training. It's days of action. How in post war years in Germany a German parachute battalion commander had told him that he had faced the 508th at Nijmegen and had never faced better and tougher troops before. He recalled our youth, glory and pride. A lot of late comers showed for this event and they were joyously welcomed.

The memorial luncheon on Sunday saw everyone gathered for the last time this year. The colors were posted, the memorial candles were lit to the roll of a drum, and taps were sounded. There wasn't a dry eye in the room.

Father (Col) Ketchersid, 18th Airborne Corps and Fort Bragg Chaplain delivered the eulogy. He spoke of and praised those who did not return home. To quote only one sentence. "Our way of life, our national heritage, is possible only because those whom we honor today, and others like them, were willing to give of themselves." It was a moving address and one to be remembered for a long time.

After luncheon was served, O B made announcements and read some telegrams and cards. Bud Warnecke then ordered the Color Guard to retire the Colors and declared the reunion adjourned.
