ARLINGTON MEMORIAL DEDICATION
OCTOBER 20, 1982

Everything is set for 10A.M., Oct. 20, 1982, in Arlington National Cemetery, Washington, D.C. Ray Costanzo, Bob Chisolm and Fran Mahan, all of I Co., have brought the project to completion.

The grove of trees will be dedicated at 10 A.M. with remarks by our Association President and an address by Lou Mendez. The 3rd Infantry, the Army ceremonial unit, will provide the color guard.

After the grove dedication we will have a Wreath and Plaque presentation ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at 10:35 A.M. O.B. Hill will make the presentation. Following this ceremony, we are invited to tour the cemetery. That will include visits to the grave sites of former 508ers.

Our men have done an excellent job planning this memorial. We are especially grateful for the help of Ray Costanzo, Superintendent of Arlington National Cemetery.

It's hoped that many of us will be able to attend the dedication. It's open to the public too. We'll be on our own for travel and accommodations. Even so, Fran Mahan suggests that we all try to stay in the same Motel, so that we can eat and move around together. If we are at one site, large scale transportation, if necessary, can be more easily arranged. EUROPEAN TOUR AND BEEK MEMORIAL SEPT. 17, 1981



The tour was a huge success. A lot was seen, there was free time, it went smoothly, and it was meaningful and impressive. The high point was the dedication of the 508th Memorial in Beek, Holland.

Our Dutch friends went all out. The Memorial is beautiful. There were 3,000 people present at the dedication, including two young men from Fort Bragg, representing our active Battalions.

To describe the tour through the eyes of the participants, here are notes from Bob and Bette Nobles, C Co.:

It was a great privilege for us to be able to return to Europe with the 508th. It is hard to describe the feeling of love and friendship the people of Holland and Belgium showered on us. The American people could learn a lesson from them in their great love of freedom.

Sept. 16 - L.A., Chicago and New York groups assembled in Amsterdam, Holland. We were bussed to the Spijker Hotel in Beek. Those of us staying in private homes met our families at the hotel. We certainly got the feel of the Dutch culture living with our hosts for three days. We had an informal reception in the evening.

Sept 17 - Former battle areas and drop zones, including the Nijmegen Bridge area, were visited. It was a beautiful day to take pictures of the bridge and the lovely floral displays nearby.

Our 508th Monument was dedicated on a plot of ground called the "Lt. John P. Foley Plantsoen" opposite the Town Hall. We attended a memorable service at St. Bartholomew Church. Later we were entertained with parachute jumps and a musical program at the School.

Sept 18 - We were driven to Arnhem to the British Airborne Museum. Later, a large reception was held in the Council Chambers of Beek. We were honored with a speech given by Margot van Boldrik, a Dutch friend of the 508th. All were presented with an illustrated booklet of the wartime experiences of the area.

After the reception, a farewell dinner was held at the Spijker Hotel. At one point in the program, I asked for a moment of silence in memory of our comrades and Dutch friends who died in 1944 and 1945. The lights went out when I returned to my seat. We thought that had been pre-arranged. Later it was learned a fuse had blown in the kitchen. The significance of the timing made a chill go down our backs.

Sept 19 - We visited the beautiful American Cemeteries at Margraten and Henri-Chappelle. Capt. Silver, "Doc" Savage, Darrell Glass and I found two of our C Co. members who are interred there: Jim Childs at Margraten and Andy Loewi at Henri-Chappelle. There was a big bash later at Leo Carlier's Supper Club in Trois Ponts. A delicious buffet was served, and the group learned a new dance, "Dance of the Ducks." Many of us found the tape later in the shops. We hope to teach our American friends how to do the Duck Dance.

Sept 20 - Several receptions were held in Belgium - in Werbomont, Manhay and LaGleize. The camaraderie was heartwarming. I drove one of the Army Jeeps the people of Belgium have maintained all these years. Luck was with us in that it always rained at night.

Sept 21 - We spent an hour in the great Cathedral at Cologne. A delightful three hour cruise on the Rhine River was enjoyed. We saw many castles and villages nestled along the river and acres of vineyards on the steep hills.

Sept 22 - We spent the day in Frankfurt. Some of us took the Underground to the area where the 503th was billeted in 1945. Bill Giegold was wounded in a slight altercation with a police dog. We also enjoyed shopping and looking at Hummels.

Sept 23 - We toured Heidelberg, which has one of the older universities in the world. We enjoyed the little shops and the old castle ruins on the hill. The castle has a wine cask that is two stories high.

Sept 24 - Part of the group flew back to the U.S. Part of the tour went on to Nottingham. Bette and I rented a car at the airport in Frankfurt. We toured for two weeks in southern Germany, Switzerland and Austria. We had a taste of driving in snow in the Alps. The scenery was the most beautiful we have ever seen. We toured "Sound of Music" country in Salzburg, Austria. If you haven't seen it, start making plans to do so.

At this point, the tour went on to Brussels for a night and then took the ferry to England via the white cliffs of Dover. The group visited Cambridge and stopped at Duxford to visit the Imperial War Museum.

The group stayed two days in Nottingham, our home away from home prior to the Normandy and Holland jumps. Group members rode to Wollaton Park in a convoy of restored Jeeps and other WW II vehicles. There was a ceremony at the park with the Sheriff of Nottingham and the Lord Mayor of Beeston present. We were told that the museum soon will be completed.

From there, it was on to Shakespeare's home in Stratford-on-Avon, a visit to Churchill's grave in Bladon, and two nights of fun in London. The group flew home from London, Sept.30.

EX POWS

This request came to us from the V.A.:

We need your help.

On Aug. 14, 1981, the President signed Public Law 97-37, known as the "Former Prisoners of War Benefits Act of 1981," expanding VA eligibility for thousands of former prisoners of war. The former POW incarceration period was reduced from 6 months to 30 days, a presumption of service connection was established for certain disabilities resulting from malnutrition, and service connected benefits were allowed for psychoses and anxiety states regardless of when first shown unless there is an intercurrent cause. In addition, former POWs are now to be provided both inpatient and outpatient medical treatment on a priority basis, and their concerns are to be considered by an advisory committee to the Administrator.

VA wants to contact all former POWs to tell them of this new legislation and to assist them in applying for benefits. To do this we need the assistance of your large network of friends to help update our locator files with current information.

We would appreciate it if you would ask the members of your organization to collect for us the following data on as many former POWs as possible and to send it to you as a control point:

- Name, Address and Telephone Number
- VA Claim Number; Social Security Number
- Whether or not veteran is presently receiving VA benefits.
