John Joseph Dugan Mathematics teacher, 66

John Joseph "Joe" Dugan, 66, of Upper Darby, a mathematics teach-er at St. Joseph's Preparatory School for the last 45 years, died Friday at Methodist Hospital from a heart attack he had suffered earlier in the week

A native of Philadelphia, Mr. Dugan was a graduate of both St. Joseph's Preparatory School and St.
Joseph's University.
Known for his sense of humor
and warmth, Mr. Dugan was honored in 1976 with the Ignation
Award, the preparatory school's Award, the preparatory school's highest honor, in recognition of excellence in teaching and commitment to the students.

"He was very, very open," said his friend and colleague Dan Brennan. "He sent a message to the students that he really cared for them. He could teach the mind and touch the soul, and he did it well."

Paul G. Eglick Pediatrician, 83

Paul G. Eglick, 83, a dedicated pe-diatrician whose practice spanned three generations and nearly five

three generations and nearly five decades, died of cancer Friday at his home in Huntingdon Valley.

Born in Philadelphia, Dr. Eglick graduated from Central High School and the University of Pennsylvania. He received his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania Medical School in 1942, and served his internship at Jewish Hospital, now the Albert Einstein Medical Center.

During World War, II, he was a

battalion surgeon and a paratrooper with the 82d Airborne Division, taking part in the invasion of Nor-

mandy.
When he returned from the war, he began a pediatrics residency at Children's Hospital.
In 1949, he started his own practice, first at Fourth and Green Streets, and then in the Somerton section of the city, where he remained for 34 years. He retired in 1997. His care and dedication to his patients and their families were legations. patients and their families were leg-

endary.
"This man literally saved lives," said his son-in-law, Richard Cohen. "There are a number of children in this world who wouldn't be here if it were not for him." A member of a number of profes-

sional societies including the American Board of Pediatrics, Dr. Eglick was also affiliated with most of the major hospitals in the

He is survived by his wife of 23 years, Esther; daughters Susan Levy, Sandy Harkavy, and Karen Cohen; sons Peter, John, and Gary Schwartz; a sister; and nine grand-children.
